to be upon a roll of Capt John Mullins
for 6 days service before marching to Camp
dated March 1776 and marched to Camp
the day before the service is not given; upon
a return of Capt John Warren after the battle
of White Plains dated Oct 28 1776; upon a
Master roll of Capt Nathl Loring Col Robinson

- 4 - 18 from Aug 1 to Dec 28 1777, and upon a pay
roll of Capt John Parker Col Deny from Oct 29 1777
1 - 15 to Nov 15 1778 and upon a pay roll of Capt

6 private; upon a pay roll of Oliver Putnam Col
11 Brown from Oct 18 1781 - Today; upon a pay roll

No. 1. To the Hon: Secretary of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Sir. — In my letter of the 8th inst. you say that no application for proof of the revolutionary service of Jonathan Tarbill can be found on your files. My letter therefore enclosing it several months ago, must have miscarried, or be lost. To procure a new statement will prove exceedingly inconvenient, somewhat expensive, and occasion delay. Under these circumstances I have presumed to deviate from your established regulations on this subject, and instead of the statement your regulations require, present you with the substance of the declaration of the widow. Her declaration was taken last August before a Judge of the County in which she resides & the Commissioner of Pensions will discover that the statement & give below, is copied from said declaration. I have therefore to request that you will return this statement with the certificate of such proof (if any) so you may discover on the revolutionary records in your office.

Jonathan Tarbill at the commencement of the revolutionary war resided in Richmond, Berkshire County in the State of Massachusetts. The widow owing to old age and consequent loss of memory is unable to state if indeed she was ever informed thereof known, the names and rank of the superior officers under whom he served and what particular rank he held — (he might have been a private at first & afterwards a subaltern officer of some grade) But according to the best of her recollection (she is now 85 years old) her husband served as a Paymaster in the Massachusetts State troops or line or in some similar capacity, because he had in his possession at sundry times large sums of money wherewith to pay off the U. S. State troops at White plains N. Y. elsewhere. Said troops belonged to the Massachusetts levies or line (or continental establishment). He served under or in connection with Captain Rathbone and Colonel Rowley. She can remember no other
